Nancy Mae Franklin, affectionately known as “Honey” was born on July 10, 1945, in Washington, DC. She was the beloved daughter of Arthur Thomas, Sr. and Viola Thomas, who raised her in a Christian home. She was the youngest of four siblings: Mamie Muse, Arthur Thomas Jr., and Bobbie Walters, who all shared a deep connection and loving bond. She entered eternal rest with grace and dignity on April 15, 2024.

Educated in the District of Columbia School System, Nancy proudly completed her academic goals, marking the beginning of her journey into the workforce. One of her earliest work experiences was working in the cafeteria at the Madison Hotel in Washington, DC. As a result of her vibrant energy and outgoing personality, Hotel management promoted her to a switchboard operator position.

Armed with excellent customer service, communication, and organizational skills, in 1966

Nancy embarked on a long fulfilling career at the Veterans Administration (VA) Medical Center, Washington, DC. She earned many opportunities for advancement

from Switchboard Operator to Eligibility Clerk, to Supervisor of Admissions, then to Administrative Officer in the Offices of Medical Research, and finally in Neurology Service. As a result of her professionalism, work ethic, and experience in her field she received numerous performance bonuses and awards. Her superior in Neurology Service held her in high esteem, stating: "When he thought of the face of Neurology at the VA, he thought of Nancy." In 1972, Nancy married her lifelong friend, Gartrell Franklin; they became friends at the age of five. They had known each other for 70 years. Together Nancy and Gartrell raised two daughters: Deborah and Rasheedah. Nancy embodied the best of qualities: unconditional love, strength of spirit, and faithful commitment that could be seen in the care for her husband, children, and family. In the 1980s, Nancy found solace and purpose in her faith, becoming a member of the New Bethany Baptist Church (NBBC), where she received the sacrament of baptism. One of her greatest joys was her membership and kinship with the NBBC Usher Ministries. She was reverent in her behavior, and demonstrated a gentle and quiet spirit, pleasing to God. Nancy weaved together her professional experience, dedication to spiritual values, and zest for life, presenting a multifaceted and vibrant life well lived. She loved traveling with her

husband, creating and showcasing her beautiful handmade jewelry, shopping, watching musical shows, hand dancing, walking in the "Race for the Cure," and she was a great cook too! Nothing beat her famous delicious spaghetti! Waiting for her at the Door to Heaven is her father, mother, sister, and brother. Nancy leaves behind a treasure trove of memories for her loved ones to hold dear.
